From the Office of Principal Tom Gwin

After three weeks in school, Winchester High School is in full stride. Students and teachers have settled into the daily routines as we move into October, cooler weather, and the MLB playoffs. When everything was said and done, we hired 33 teachers, counselors, teaching assistants, and in-house substitute teachers for the new school year. That represents about 25% of the staff. School enrollment is at 1082 students, down slightly from last year. Next year we are projected to be slightly above 1100 students and enrollment continues to increase in subsequent years. With both enrollment and diversity increasing in the student body, strengthening the school climate will be a major goal in the years ahead. Our Student Leadership Development Program and the Rachel's Challenge assemblies will be important components of achieving this goal.

Student Leadership Development Program: Last May, 65 students participated in a one day leadership training that was designed to open their eyes, hearts, and minds to the problems and possibilities that exist at WHS. On September 12, twenty five students spent the first of three days in an intensive leadership development workshop learning from each other, addressing school climate issues, developing leadership skills, and learning how to take their knowledge to the greater community. These twenty-five students will participate in two more days of training in October. Our plan is to expose this kind of training to as many students and staff members as possible with the ultimate goal of creating a stronger school environment where every student feels safe, cared for, and celebrated. Rachel's Challenge: All students will see the assembly program, Rachel's Challenge, on October 23 or 24. Rachel Scott was the first person killed at Columbine High School on April 20, 1999. Her acts of kindness and compassion along with the contents of her six diaries have become the foundation for a school assembly program. The program includes footage of the Columbine tragedy and an inspirational presentation by Rachel's uncle. The program emphasizes caring and respect for all members of the school community in the effort to improve school climate. The program will be presented to parents and community members at 7 pm on October 23 in the WHS auditorium. All are welcome. I strongly encourage you to attend. Special thanks to the Winchester Substance Abuse Coalition for sponsoring this program.

MCAS Results: Students should receive 2008 MCAS results in your home mail by the end of September. Seniors will receive U.S. History scores, juniors will receive Math and English Language Arts scores, sophomores will receive Biology scores and freshmen will receive their eighth grade scores. I have the unofficial raw scores and know the high school performed very well once again. I will report on the official scores in the November newsletter. Currently passing the Math and English MCAS exams is a graduation requirement; passing science becomes a requirement for the Class of 2010. Recently the state eased the appeal rule for the science MCAS. Students who have taken the science exam and failed can file an appeal based on their performance in their next science course and having a 95% attendance rate in the course.

New Handbook Policies: There are two new policy changes related to attendance. You will be able to locate this information within the pages of your student's planner. The first is very straight forward. If any student leaves campus during the school day without permission or an excused dismissal, he or she will receive a one day suspension. The second is called the N rule and is successfully used in other high schools in the area (Newton North and South and Weston High School) to improve student attendance. Formerly we had the eight day rule. When students reached 8 absences in a semester they would lose 2.5 credits of credits unless there was a medically documented excusal or the loss of credit was successfully appealed. This past year, some seniors did not graduate or came close to not graduating because of loss of credit due to absences. The N rule brings a greater urgency to the importance of daily school attendance. With the N rule, when a student reaches 5 absences in a quarter in a course, the student will receive a grade of N on the report card in that class. The N is merely an attendance grade. The academic grade that the student achieved for the quarter is what will be averaged into the final grade so the student's final transcript will not be affected. However the N on the report card indicates to the students and parents/guardians that attendance is an issue. Students, who receive 3 or 4 Ns in a course during the year, will receive an N for the year with no credit. Certain types of absences that will not count toward the N rule include extended or chronic illness with medical documentation, field trips, college visits, school suspensions, religious holidays, and administrative exemptions granted by the principal. For N rule details, see pages 26-7 in the planner. Already, I sense a greater awareness of the importance of school attendance as students discuss not missing days for unimportant reasons.

Student Flu Shots: For those students who signed up and paid last June, flu shots will be given in school on Tuesday, October 21. Students will be called to the Nurses Office individually by our school nurse, Mrs. Britt. Unfortunately, because the order was based on the number of students who registered in June, no other students will be able to receive flu shots at this time.

Photo Retakes: Burlington Studios will be back at school on Tuesday, October 7 for photo retakes during both lunch blocks in the corridor outside the cafeteria. If you student is new to WHS and has not had their photograph taken this would be a good opportunity to do so.

MESSAGES FROM THE ASSISTANT PRINCIPALS

VISITORS: All visitors to the high school, including parents, must check in and sign a Visitors Log in the Main Office. All visitors must wear a visitor's name tag. Individuals who do not attend Winchester High School or are not on official business but are on the school grounds or in the school building will be treated as trespassers. This offense is a violation of the General Laws of the Commonwealth and carries a fine and/or imprisonment. Police will be notified.

DRESS CODE REMINDER: Students should refer to page 37 in their student handbook. Specifically, students should not wear any clothing that would be a distraction or a disruption to the educational process. At no time are hoods allowed to be worn. Girls are not permitted to wear strapless or low cut tops. Inappropriate dress will result in a student being asked to change clothing, cover up and parental contact.

PERSONAL ELECTRONIC EQUIPMENT: Students are not allowed to use a cell phone in school at any time. All cell phones must be turned off. A student in violation of this policy will have his/her cell phone taken away and sent to an administrator. A parent must meet with an Administrator to pick up the phone. Ipods, MP3 players etc., cannot be used in class but they may be used at lunch.

DISMISSALS: A reminder to all parents that if your student is to be dismissed from school, they must be excused with an explanatory note or telephone call from a parent/guardian to the Main Office PRIOR TO THE DISMISSAL. A NOTE AFTER THE FACT WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED. A student may also be dismissed from school at the discretion of the Assistant Principal/s and the School Nurse. Parents will be contacted prior to the dismissal.

OFF CAMPUS: Parents are reminded that Senior and Junior privileges (open ends and lunch) are as follows: Seniors who have open end privileges are only allowed to arrive at school or leave school for one period at the beginning or the end of the day. Additionally, lunch privileges are limited to the lunch period that the student is assigned. They do not include any class or assigned academic block (study hall) during the lunch periods. Junior lunch privileges are only for the lunch period that they are assigned and not the entire lunch block from 11:21-1:03. Juniors must attend assigned classes or study halls during the lunch block. Failure to follow school policy for these privileges could result in forfeiture of these privileges. Any student who leaves campus without permission will be suspended.

ATTENTION SENIORS: Cap & Gown Measurements

Cap and Gown Measurements will take place on Thursday October 23rd, during both lunches. Measurements will be held in the red staircase by the student parking lot. The cost is \$17.00, checks should be made payable to: Winchester High School. Student's name and "cap & gown" should be written on the memo. Each outfit comes with a tassel, which students will receive in June. If you wish to purchase a tassel now please have \$4.00 cash to pay the University Cap & Gown Representative. You Must have your Check/Cash to be measured! You will also be asked to verify your name, spelling etc. for your diploma.

Also slated for this year are opportunities to get to know the new Guidance Director and Athletic Director, who will be invited to talk about their vision for those two important areas of student life. By the time you receive this newsletter, it will be time for Open House. Rushed as it is, and lost as I always get, I am a big fan of this annual evening. What I enjoy most is the energy in the building coming from the faculty (I particularly enjoy the science demonstrations!) and also from the students as they compete for our attention to advertise what their teams and clubs are doing and selling. 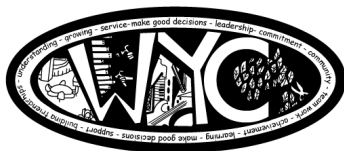
